What is Fluoride Varnish?

Fluoride varnish (FV) is a highly concentrated form of fluoride that is applied to tooth surfaces to prevent new cavities and help reverse early demineralization (white spots) of the tooth enamel. Fluoride varnish is a resin or synthetic base that sets quickly on contact with teeth in the presence of saliva, adhering to the tooth for several hours. Developed more than thirty years ago in Europe, FV is available by prescription only and can be quickly applied to a child's teeth by dental and non-dental primary care providers. Application does not require special equipment, is well-received by very young children and prevents Early Childhood Caries (ECC).



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What is Early Childhood Caries?

Early Childhood Caries (ECC) affects the primary teeth of infants and toddlers and is caused by frequent and prolonged exposure to carbohydrates in the presence of oral bacteria. ECC can be a devastating problem for young children and their families. ECC can result in pain, infection, malocclusion and difficulty chewing. It has been associated with poor weight gain and an increased risk of dental decay in adult teeth.

Treatment of ECC may require extensive restorative services, with costs to treat a case of ECC easily reaching \$2,000 to \$3,000 per child. Each year, only seven percent of Ohio's children eligible for Medicaid receive dental services through Medicaid. Yet, nearly 92 percent of Ohio's children eligible for Medicaid receive either an initial or periodic health screen through a primary care physician. If the primary care provider is more likely to see these high-risk children, it makes sense to work with family physicians and pediatricians to prevent ECC and link young children with dental homes.

Web-Based Training

Smiles for Ohio - Fluoride Varnish Training for Primary Medical Care Providers Serving Young Children Enrolled in Medicaid is an award-winning Web-based curriculum developed by the Ohio Department of Health (ODH) that consists of four modules, each designed to provide physicians, nurses and other health care providers with the knowledge needed to reduce dental caries among children under age 6. 

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Did You Know?

In State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2012, more than 10,700 children aged 3 and under benefited from the application of fluoride varnish, provided by more than 233 non-dental providers in the State of Ohio. The graph below shows how the program has grown in recent years. There has been more than a 405 percent increase in children receiving fluoride varnish applications and a 651 percent increase in providers (non-dental) applying FV between SFY2007 and SFY2012.



Medicaid Coverage of Fluoride Varnish Application by Non-Dental Health Providers

Ohio medical providers can be reimbursed by Medicaid for the application of fluoride varnish (FV) for children up to their sixth birthday. Eligible providers can provide a FV treatment during the course of a well or sick child examination. The Medicaid reimbursement is limited to one application every 180 days.



Referrals to a dental home for children who exhibit signs of oral health problems are an integral part of the Smiles for Ohio Fluoride Varnish Program. Providing fluoride varnish and education about the causes of Early Childhood Caries can help decrease your patient's risk for tooth decay throughout their lifetime.



Assistance with Billing

This service is reimbursable by Medicaid (\$15.00) when provided in addition to a well or sick child visit, but cannot be the sole reason for the visit. In order to be reimbursed, primary care providers must submit current dental terminology (CDT) code **D1208** on a physician claim form. This is a new code that went into effect in January 2013. Coverage for FV application is limited to one application every one hundred and eighty days. The FV reimbursement code includes **three components**, each of which must be performed: 1) oral assessment, 2) varnish application and 3) referral to a dentist, as necessary.
